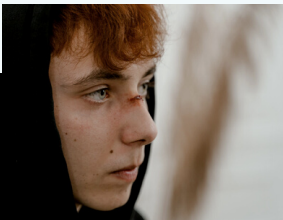
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Indicators of Human Trafficking

(National Human Trafficking Hotline, n.d)

1. Does the person appear disconnected from family or friends?
2. Is the child attending school?
3. A sudden change in behavior?
4. Suspect a juvenile is engaged in commercial sex acts?
5. Is the person showing signs of mental or physical abuse?
6. Does the person have visible bruises that appear to be healing?
7. Does the person appear fearful or submissive?
8. Does the person show signs of malnutrition or in need of medical care?
9. Is the person regularly in the company of someone to who seems to be in control of where they go or who they talk to?
10. Does the person appear to be coached on what to say?
11. Is the person living in unsuitable conditions?
12. Can the person produce personal possessions?
13. Does the person have freedom of movement?
14. Can the person freely leave where they live?
15. Are there unreasonable security measures?
